If you like live program chats about various technical ham radio issues, this is for you. You can even participate with questions and comments. And you can retrieve past podcasts of sessions you missed. There is quite a list of past programs that may interest you. I tuned in to hear Part 1 of a "troubleshooting" program. Check it out.

We are expecting any day now to transition over to a new Website host provider that will greatly ease the skills required to update our Website. We chose to do this because of the lack of volunteers who have skills dealing with html code required of our previous Website. I expect to announce a new Webmaster shortly. Those of you who like setting up for Field Day, playing Radio in the Park, and enjoying a day of camarade-rie with other members while using multiple portable radio stations, will enjoy the activity planned by John KC9OJV on Sept. 8, starting at 9:00 AM at Blackwell Forest Preserve (Warrenville) – East shelter. John calls it "Rockin' in the Park, because his primary rig will be a Softrock SDR radio operated QRP with batteries and maybe even a few solar cells. Come if you just want to investigate, or if you want to bring your QRP gear out and operate a few feet away.

If you have a laptop or desktop computer that is giving you all sorts of problems, and you do not want restore it to its original state when new, why not convert it to a Linux machine rather than send it off to the recycling center? Linux operating systems work more efficiently than Windows based systems on consumer PCs, and you do not have to deal with nearly the extent of Internet threats that Windows machines deal. You need a good PC with DVD drive to download free Linux software and burn an image of the package. That DVD can then be inserted into the "old" PC and it will install itself. You can elect to install Linux adjacent to Windows on your hard drive, or completely remove Windows during the Linux installation. My daughter had an unrecoverable hard drive crash on a three year old Windows laptop. The operating system could not be recovered either. So I saved it from the "junk" man, replaced the hard drive, and installed a current version of Linux Mint. I now have a nice backup PC, although it does not run on Windows. But other free programs such as "Wine" or "Virtual Box" can be installed to run Windows applications. There are some interesting software applications that run on Linux, such as several "free" logging and digital programs. Total cost to me was \$65 for a replacement 250 GB hard drive! Mike K9FE and others can help you if you have such an opportunity.

A few weeks ago a former FRRL member Frank Christensen WA9TRG contacted me to take over a couple boxes of old FRRL memorabilia including photos, newspaper articles, and other assorted items. I met him and gladly accepted the material. That brings up the issue of what do I do with this stuff? Are there other old boxes of FRRL "stuff" around that could be added to the pile? Is anyone willing to work with a few others to review everything and recommend what we do with it? Some say the old pictures and slides could be scanned and converted to digital media and put on DVD for longer life enjoyment and storage. I'm inclined to appoint an adhoc committee of those interested in reviewing this material. What say? Anyone out there interested in looking over this old material? Let me know.

Meeting Minutes August 14, 2012

The meeting was called to order at 7:35 PM by President Harry K9DXA.

• Question of the month was: What ham radio activities would you be interested in leading or participating in? Answers included working the higher bands, working digital modes, SDR, FSTV, contesting, Scout-o-Rama, HF digital voice, getting on the air again, tower activities, UHF-ATV, license upgrades, on-air activities, helping other hams, fox hunts, homebrew and restoration, antenna work, PSK, QRP, stealth antennas and emergency communications.

Reports:

- Secretary's Report: Randal KC9KAX presented minutes from the June and July membership meetings. It was moved and seconded to accept the minutes. The motion carried.
- **Treasurers Report:** Dean KC9EOQ provided the treasurer's report. He also informed members that our storage space cost was increased, from \$85 to \$92 per month.
- **Program:** Dick AH6EZ previewed the evening's program, which was a video he created discussing DX skills, how to prepare for a DXpedition, and what to expect, based on his and Harry's recent VY0 experience.
- **Hamfest:** Dawn KC9LQS reported that this year's event was a success, due to the many members who contributed their time, expertise and hard work, and thanked everyone for their participation.
- Education Eric AB9OS reported that the Extra upgrade class has been confirmed beginning in September, and that individual help will be available to students who need it.
- **ARES** No report from Kendall County. DuPage ARES reported that they will be participating in the MS Ride on Sept. 8 and the Chicago Marathon on Oct. 7th. Kane County ARES reported that they meet on the last Thursday of each month at the St. Charles EOC conference room.

Old Business

- **Emergency simulation:** Bill NF9D discussed the upcoming emergency simulation planned by FRRL. The event will include training, followed by the exercise, and will take about 2 to 2-1/2 hours. More than 25 members signed up to participate.
- Social Media: Harry reiterated the board's discussion on the usefulness of the club's various communications tools. He suggested phasing out the Arc Over in its current form, and substituting a page on the club's website to fulfill the requirement for a newsletter as per the bylaws. He suggested keeping the website and the Yahoo Groups list, making Facebook a static fan page, and dropping Twitter. Member comments were strongly against this strategy, suggesting that members value the Arc Over and would welcome its expansion. Younger members of the club pointed out that social media was not only useful, but perhaps necessary to reach the new generation of hams, and that even though social media is not used as heavily (if at all) by all hams, it is a way of life for younger hams. PR Chair Debbie WX9VOR added that there seems to be a great deal of misunderstanding about the role and necessity of digital media in the club's PR efforts. The discussion was tabled pending further research.

Announcements

Dick W9GIG announced that this year's winter banquet would be held Jan. 29 at St. Charles Place, with ticket prices ranging from \$28 to \$43 depending on the entrée selected. Price includes tip and gratuity. Entertainment will be provided by Ward Silver N0AX, and a cash bar will be available.

Adjournment

A motion to adjourn was made and seconded. The motion carried and the meeting adjourned at (9:15 PM?)

D64K was a DXpedition to Comoros Islands (IOTA AF-007). The Comoro Islands or Comoros are an archipelago of volcanic islands situated off the south-east coast of Africa, to the east of Mozambique and northwest of Madagascar. First colonized by the French in the early 1800's, this group of islands has struggled for clarity in both independence and international recognition. As such, there is plenty of red tape involved with any DXpedition, giving this contact its asterisk status.

NA9A shares some fun news with us this month. Along with working asterisk entities JX9JKA Jan Mayen, D64K Comoros, EZ1A Turkmenistan, he also received a QSL card from II2POPE! Very cool stuff Joe.
