St. Rita Antennas—On the Road to a Club Shack

Now that we have successfully installed HF and VHF/UHF vertical antennas up on the roof of the church, it is interesting to think back over the journey that started over four months ago when the idea of placing antennas up on the roof of the church for our use in the basement was re-initiated by AH6EZ. Since he had a Motorola Canopy wireless link on hand and Dean had a spare WiFi Access Point on hand, it was a relatively straight forward task to get that part of the project installed and working. To our amusement, Fr. Cesar has enjoyed WiFi coverage directly upstairs, while waiting between Parish appointments.

The roof top antenna part of the project required considerable thought and weighing the aspects of personal safety, protecting the rubber membrane roof, church and club liability, RF performance, radials or not, bands of operation, and cost. AH6EZ made a side by side list of many commercial vertical HF antennas, initially focusing on verticals that did not require radials. The costs were relatively high and the height or weight were troubling with the potential of roof damage if the antenna blew over. Several different mounting platforms and tripods were investigated. Unfortunately there is no place on the roof to attach any

guys. We looked at Hustler 6BTV, Cushcraft R8, Hygain DX88, Butternut HF9V, MFJ1798, Hygain AV640, Hygain AV6160, Steppir Biggir, Gap Titan, Comet CHA250B, Diamond CP6AR, DX Engineering DXE-MBVE-1-4UPR, and MFJ2990. We looked at sourcing from Universal Radio, Gigaparts, AES, Ham City, Ham Radio Outlet, Texas Tower, and DX Engineering. The cost proposal of \$1500 that was approved by a membership vote at the November meeting included an MFJ1798, but after further thought it was judged to be too complex to construct and too flimsy to withstand wind and snow storms. The cost proposal also included an estimate for a lockable radio cabinet that could be rolled out of storage for use by the FRRL and properly trained and licensed Parish members (most likely just Fr. Cesar).

We worked with Fr. Cesar to write up and get signatures on a simple Memorandum of Understanding which described ownership, maintenance, insurance, usage, and removal considerations.

The final design for the antenna, which is now installed on the roof, includes an MFJ 33 foot high fiberglass telescopic mast with an internal wire for a radiating element. Dick found a source of small gauge teflon coated red wire at American Scientific which was inexpensive. There is a 200 watt MFJ waterproof automatic antenna tuner that can tune the vertical from 80-10 meters (eventually 160m with a tweak in the Spring).

An MFJ heavy duty tripod is used at the base and is weighed down by 6 large concrete blocks which are tied together. There are twelve 20 foot long radials tied to bricks. This configuration saved enough money to be able to afford a Diamond V2000 tri-band vertical antenna for 6m, 2m, and 440. We did not want to exclude our Technician Class licensed members.

The V2000 is presently clamped to one of the legs of the tripod. It may be eventually moved to a higher location to allow better resonance on 6m and better coverage. Each antenna has a 100 foot length of 9913 low loss and 100% shielded cable to minimize the potential noise pickup from the nearby Canopy Ethernet cables. There are labeled feedthru connectors at a window frame at the rear of the meeting room. There will be one or both 100 foot runs of RG213 run near the center aisle to reach the front of the meeting room. The number of longer term and especially newer members who joined the work party to get the equipment up onto the roof in near 30 degree weather, as well as getting the RF cables off the roof, down the wall, and through the window frames was gratifying. This included AH6EZ, K9DXA, KC9EOQ, K9LGE, K9WDB, KB9KP, KC9VGH, KC9UTT, KB9RFX, and KC9OJV.

A radio cabinet with large locking castor wheels is being built which will be 2 feet deep, ventilated for possible remote operation while closed and locked, 4 foot wide for several radios and computers, 4 foot high for a main radio shelf, auxiliary equipment above, power supplies and cable storage below, and a slide out writing surface.

I know that we are all looking forward to being able to see radios and other on the air technology being demonstrated and be able to allow hands on operation by club members before, during (as a program), and after the meetings. We hope to be able to initiate a "Radio of the Month" activity which will allow members to bring in a wide variety of radios for demonstration and operating training. Eventually we hope to be able to offer password protected Internet remote station operation (HF and VHF), especially for those licensed members who do not have the ability to put up their own station or antenna.

About the FRRL

The Fox River Radio League, Inc., is a general interest amateur radio club serving the central Fox River Valley area. Records indicate the club has been in existence since at least 1924, and has functioned continuously ever since. We are an ARRL Special Service Club, an Illinois not-for-profit corporation, and a 501(c)(3) tax exempt organization as specified in IRS Statutes.

We sponsor training classes for new hams, license examination sessions, an annual hamfest, and participate in various public service events. If you have a specialized amateur radio interest, chances are you can share it with one or more of our club members.

The Fox River Radio League meets on the 2nd Tuesday of every month at St. Rita of Cascia Church in Aurora. The meeting begins at 7:30 PM and includes social time,

a business portion and a program of interest.

All persons interested in amateur radio are invited to attend. Families are welcome.
