As the ARRL's Centennial year comes to a close, so does the steady stream of "W1AW Portable" operations that have brought so many to the HF bands in 2014. Folks who probably didn't see themselves doing a lot of HF operating have found themselves watching propagation, building antennas, jumping into pileups and generally having a great time! This series of events, shining a spotlight around the continent and out into the Pacific and Caribbean, has been one of the most popular ARRL programs ever.

So what happens on January 1st when W1AW/something disappears from the airwaves and returns to its little brick building at 225 Main Street in Newington, Connecticut under the watchful portrait of The Old Man? We'll all have pileup withdrawal, that's what! I haven't heard of any follow-up program and I think the several million contacts will take some time to confirm, but still, mike-button thumbs, keyboard fingertips, and key-tapping digits will be eager for activity in 2015.

This is your opportunity to guide new HF operators in building on their success through award programs and contests. These are always available and with a year's worth of experience chasing W1AW, our new operators will find easy success as they fill their logs with DX, rare counties, and hours of contacts. Now is the time to schedule a late-December or January club program about operating in contests or chasing awards like DXCC or CQ's WPX.

Show them how to keep an envelope on file at the QSL bureau - and maybe even volunteer to sort a letter or two. If they're not on Logbook Of the World, why not explain how that works. Present a survey of some of the awards within their reach. The K1BV Awards Directory is free and lists more the 3,300 awards for accomplishments small, large, and...strange!

Those of us who have been around for a while tend to forget how thrilling it was to complete Worked All Continents. Or maybe that first time you experienced a solid over-the-pole or long-path opening during a contest, filling the log with call signs you never expected to hear, much less log. Hey, pass it on! Be a radiosport Elmer and have a ready answer when asked, "What is there to do now?"

President's Traffic

November brings damp, chilly days, longer nights, and fewer outdoor activities vying for our limited free time. It's an ideal opportunity, as individual hams and as a club, both to catch up and plan ahead.

Catching up covers a wide spectrum. It can mean tackling administrative and organizational tasks like confirming QSOs, updating logs, giving the shack a good fall cleaning, or reorganizing tools, equipment and spare parts that accumulated during the hectic summer months.

Fall is a good time to catch up on maintenance, too. If you haven't done so already, make sure your antennas and tower, if you have one, are in optimal condition and ready to face another season of above-average snowfall and below-average temperatures. Check your manufacturer's recommendations, but in general, this is the time to make sure your connectors are adequately weather sealed, nuts and bolts are tight, brackets are secure, and cables and thrust bearing are lubricated. If you have a wire antenna like I do, it's a good idea to lower it and give it the same once-over, ensure your ropes are still in good shape, then raise and re-secure it. Preventative maintenance now will help improve the odds that we all stay on the air throughout the winter, and it's much more pleasant to freshen things up now rather than face repairs in the snow!

As winter approaches, it's also a good time to explore new technologies and operating modes that interest you. Several members of the club have expressed an interest in learning or improving CW, for example, while others might want to delve deeper into an aspect of radio in which they already have a base of knowledge. Why not pick up a few books, find online resources, and get together with other club members who share your interest? By spring, you'll be proficient enough to present a program on the topic – and you'll have fun along the way.

The slower months of the year also give us an opportunity to look ahead and begin laying the ground-work for new challenges. Internal improvements to the shack can be done regardless of the weather, and you can certainly develop plans for antenna improvements any time of year – and possibly act on them as weather permits. (A word of warning, though: be absolutely sure your tower is free of ice if you decide to do antenna work; the presence of ice can decrease the wind load rating substantially, putting undue stress on the structure and making it unsafe to climb.)

As a club, we're doing much of the same kind of catching up and planning ahead. Soon, we will elect the officers who will guide FRRL through the coming year. Right now, the current board is evaluating the club's efforts and activities, deciding where resources were well spent and considering where to allocate them in the coming year (subject to the decisions of next year's board, of course). We've also been exploring alternative ways to make our internal processes more efficient, and looking at what has worked, what hasn't, and how we as a club might continue to grow in the future.

I hope you are planning to take advantage of the lull over the next few months by investing in the development of your skills and knowledge, and your enjoyment of the hobby. And if you are so inclined, perhaps you might share your growing expertise with fellow club members in the months ahead.

October 14, 2014

Meeting was called to order by Dawn KC9LQS at 7:33 p.m.

After the intros, Dawn presented the next Fxpedition question: What would you like to see as our activity during this year's holiday party in December?

Reports:

Minutes from prior meeting were presented. Mike K9FE made the motion to accept them and Denny W9HI seconded. The minutes were approved by the membership in attendance.

Treasurer's Report: Dean, KC9EOQ presented the current balances.

Program Speaker

Carl Luetzelschwab K9LA was licensed in 1961 (WN9AVT), and enjoys propagation, DXing, contesting, playing with antennas, and working on and using vintage equipment. Carl is a graduate of Purdue University, and retired in October 2013. He was an RF design engineer for Motorola and Raytheon (formerly Magnavox).

Carl's presentation is two-fold. First, he will give an update on Solar Cycle 24 and he will review the early predictions for Cycle 25, including a discussion of the possibility of entering another Maunder Minimum.

Second, he will review the historical contributions by Amateur Radio operators to the science of radio. He will then tie this into ways to bring youth into Amateur Radio to turn around the ever-increasing average age of those in our hobby and to invigorate clubs.
