President's Traffic

Here is what we do, turn on the radio, go to our favorite frequency, and listen. Lately there probably has been a lot of silence. In our case it is both on VHF/UHF and HF. After listening and hearing nothing did you give out your call as listening or call CQ on HF? Many times we can be fooled by what we think is a dead band. If everyone thinks the band is dead then no one is there because we are all "listening". If you are into VHF/UHF and our repeaters are quiet then announce yourself. You will be amazed just how many times someone will come back to your call. Don't give up if it still stays silent. There are many repeaters you can probably work. Try a different one. You can even make real contacts in simplex mode. Direct radio to radio. On 2m the simplex frequency is 146.520, no offset, no PL.

The same is true on HF. Often a seemingly dead band has some lurkers but the key is to find them. On HF you can look for some of the daily nets. On HF there seems to be no end to NET OPERATION. Check out the assigned calling frequencies, every band has one for each mode. One favorite place I like to go on 20 meters is the Maritime Net on 14.300. Throw out your call as a check-in. You may not be on a ship, but the net control wants to know just how the band is running. By your check-in you added another bit of data to his or her list. So what is the key to finding someone to talk to? It starts with you. Taking the initiative is a major step. Don't be shy of that microphone/key/computer.

Priorities! Do you have your priorities in line? Have you found yourself taking family time to play radio? Keeping the wife and kids happy should be more important than a hobby. What is that phrase? When momma ain't happy, no one is happy. Hopefully you have found the right balance. If not, keep looking for the point that you have enough radio time and enough family time.

Life is very pleasant when that point is found.

Have you ever found yourself in a near accident situation while you were on the radio in the car? When in high speed traffic things happen very fast. You need to focus on the safety of what you are doing. Often when we get into this hobby it consumes us. For a period of time we eat, drink, and breathe radio. Initially that is normal, but this is a hobby. Family and safety come before radio. I have let radio take over my life more times that I want to admit. Learn to enjoy it as a hobby and you will find that you enjoy it even more.

Coming up in early May is the MS-WALK. The FRRL has provided communications for many years for the Fox Valley MS-WALK which starts and finishes at Potawatomi Park in St. Charles. Michelle, KC9HDB, is the current FRRL MS-WALK coordinator. She will be asking for you to donate some time to the Walk communications. There are 3 areas that need to be covered. The Start/Finish, Langum Park, and Fabyan park (Just downhill from the windmill). Usually 2-4 operators at each point is enough. However more makes it easier for those that only have a couple hours of free time to donate. The Walk starts around 8AM (7:30 AM arrival) and ends usually before 1PM. It is light duty, but being there helps the logistics so the Walk runs smoothly. If you have never worked the Walk give it a try.

The SDR SIG is getting larger. They are building SoftRock SDR receivers from a kit. The techniques are challenging to learn but that is what the SDR SIG is all about: working on your own projects together, trading hints and tips for the construction. Some of the parts are not much bigger than a grain of sand. Yet they are able to solder them to circuit boards to build this top notch receiver. Contest Corner

My favorite thing about ham radio is making contacts all over the world, especially in "exotic" countries. I'm sure many people have dreams about what they would do if they won the lottery or became independently wealthy. If that happened to me, I would travel around the world, seeing as many places as I possibly could. I don't want to be a tourist; I want to see people in their everyday lives, eat their food, experience their culture and get a better understanding of life elsewhere.

Admittedly, most of my radio contacts are no more than a few seconds, exchanging a report in a contest. But, without the contests, I would have less of a chance to mark off all the countries I am "visiting". Yes, I am turning into a contest junkie!

What thrills me about contesting is finally getting through, hearing someone repeat my Kilo 9 or Tango Charlie Delta, or sometimes just the Charlie Delta. At that point I know I've "made it" and that state or country is now mine. Of course, the ham I am working needs to send a QSL card or post to Logbook of the World in order for the QSO to truly count. I confess I am a paper chaser. I want that Worked All States award and that DXCC is my elusive target dangling in front of me whenever I hear a new country.

In some recent DX contests I was able to test out the new antenna my husband so thoughtfully got for me. It worked great! In the ARRL DX contest I actually got New Zealand and Iceland. I couldn't believe it! I had to run upstairs to tell Tom, WB9CHY. After I got Iceland I thought to myself, I wonder if Greenland is out there. For some reason I think of those two countries together. About an hour later I did hear Greenland! Unfortunately, he couldn't hear me. He was running 1000 watts and with my 100 watts I just couldn't cut through to him. Oh well, maybe someday I'll get through to Greenland. Two weeks later was the CQ Worldwide contest. My antenna didn't disappoint me. I reached Senegal, my first African continent contact. Then I got Cape Verde, Morocco and Guinea-Bissau! I was jonesing now! I couldn't get enough. I kept trolling the 20m band for new countries, and I did get many. Finally I realized that if I didn't get repeat countries, I would have less of a chance for confirmation in LoTW. I decided to be less discriminating and try for everyone I heard.

As of now I have 37 countries confirmed via LoTW and 43 states. I think I will have a better chance of getting the WAS award with QSL cards. I have made contact with South Dakota twice, with the same man. I think he's the only ham in SD! He is elderly and only sends QSL cards. I will have to find time between contests to sit down and write up some more cards. Thank goodness for Forever stamps.

For those of you who are new to HF, the best way to get over your mic shyness is to just jump in and get on the air. For me, in the beginning a true QSO with all the protocols was a bit scary. When Tom encouraged me a few years ago to try a 6m contest I listened for a while to figure out what to say, then tried it. I was fine. I didn't goof up and say the wrong thing. Plus, everyone was pretty nice. Since the response is the same for each contact in a contest, it becomes automatic. Just pouncing (answering a call) doesn't require much thought. A few years later and I am now comfortable with calling CQ, since I have listened to so many other hams in various contests. I've learned what approaches I like and don't like.

I have had a few longer QSOs, which are great, and I would love to have conversations with people in other countries to find out what life is really like there. However, with language barriers and sometimes thick accents, those longer conversations are not always realistic. For me, merely reaching a far distant place is enough to keep the dream alive. I can visit all over the world, even if it is from behind the mic in the basement with one hand on the push-to-talk button and the other on the log.

Special Interest Groups

Ten members of the FRRL Software Defined Radio (SDR) SIG met again on March 28, 2009 at Rasmussen College to build their SoftRock, Lite+USB Xtall v9.0 with electronically switched bandpass filter receiver SDR kit. Four members brought fresh kits and got started with help and work stations provided by Bill, W9WRS, Tom, AB9IN, and Dick, AH6EZ. Everyone successfully completed the first power supply section of the build and passed the first section testing.

Dick, AH6EZ brought his trusty Buddipole antenna for use in demonstrating SoftRock SDRs brought by himself and Tom, AB9IN. Tom demonstrated a 40M SDR set to receive CW and PSK. Dick set up his SDR, laptop and an outboard sound card to show integration and operation of the kit.

Bill, W9WRS demonstrated a technique using a craft "embossing heat tool" and a syringe of solder/flux mix to quickly mount surface-mount components on PC boards. He also showed how easy it is to remove a multipin device from a PC board.

The four happy new kit builders are Bill, NF9D, Tom, WB9CHY, Dean, KC9EOQ, and John, AG9D.

The SIG will meet again on Saturday morning, April 25, 2009 at Rasmussen College to provide building assistance, including soldering techniques and a demonstration on winding those pesky "lifesaver" size toroids. There will also be an opportunity to demonstrate downloading, installing, and using Rocky v3.6 software. There is still plenty of time to get your kit and start the build.
