Announcing: The ARRL International Grid Chase

A new and exciting operating event will kick off on January 1, 2018, at 0000 UTC (New Year's Eve in US time zones), when the <u>ARRL International Grid Chase</u> gets under way. The year-long event hopes to build on the success of the highly successful 2016 National Parks on the Air (NPOTA). The objective is to work stations on *any* band (*except*60 meters) in as many different Maidenhead grid squares as possible, and then upload your log data to ARRL's Logbook of The World (LoTW). Registration in LoTW is free, and it costs nothing to participate

Many hams are familiar with grid squares from the VHF/UHF and satellite realms, and everyone lives in one. ARRL's VUCC is based on grid squares, and some contests on HF, VHF, and UHF also use them as a scoring factor.

The Maidenhead grid square system divvies up the entire globe into 324 fields, each containing 100 grid squares 1° latitude × 2° longitude in size. With 32,400 potential grid squares, it's not likely that anyone will run out of challenges, even though some grid squares are surrounded entirely by water or are in areas that are uninhabited or difficult to access.

If you don't know your grid square, David Levine, K2DSL, has an <u>online calculator</u>. Just enter a postal address, ZIP code, or even a call sign, and his site will tell you the grid square for that location. For example, enter "W1AW" and the site will return "FN31pr." For the purposes of the ARRL International Grid Chase, though, just the two initial letters and the two numbers that follow (e.g., FN31) are all you'll need to know.

Once you get active in the chase and start uploading your log data, each new grid square contact confirmed through LoTW will count toward your monthly total. Getting started is simple. Turn on the radio and just call CQ or "CQ Grid Chase" or listen for others doing the same. Make a contact, exchange grid squares, log it, and move on to another. At the end of each month, your totals on the Grid Chase leader board will reset to zero, although the system retains these to determine top finishers in various categories at the end of the year.

Any contact you make in 2018 can count toward your Chase score; it doesn't have to involve an exchange of grid squares. As long as the other operators also participate in LoTW, you'll get credit automatically when they upload their logs. This means that contest contacts also count, as will contacts with special event stations or other on-air activity that uses LoTW to confirm contacts.

There are no restrictions on modes or bands, as long as they are legal. Satellite contacts are valid for the Chase. The event is open to all radio amateurs. Full details of the ARRL International Grid Chase will appear in the December 2017 issue of QST.

About the FRRL

The Fox River Radio League, Inc., is a general interest amateur radio club serving the central Fox River Valley area. Records indicate the club has been in existence since at least 1924, and has functioned continuously ever since. We are an ARRL Special Service Club, an Illinois not-for-profit corporation, and a 501(c)(3) tax exempt organization as specified in Federal IRS Statutes. We sponsor training classes for new hams, license examination sessions, an annual hamfest, and participate in various public service events. Bill Erikson HF Challenge

Participation is gaining momentum now that shorter days and cooler nights are keeping us indoors more often, and it's paying off in increasing scores and milestones reached. In the latter regard, congrats to Mike K9FE who reached two milestones. The first is DXCC for digital, which Mike notes can be quite a challenge. "I was hung up at 98 countries for a year," he said, "until the new FT-8 mode exploded. It's faster than JT-65. Not as sensitive, but a lot of fun!" Mike also received his Worked All States on 20, 40 and 80 meters, using JT-65 and FT-8.

It's been a good month for many HF Challenge participants. "Propagation has improved markedly, activity has increased on the higher bands during the daytime, and during grey-line hours," noted participant Larry K9ARZ. "Evening activity has also improved on 40 meters. Activity since last month included: 3C1 Equatorial Guinea, 3C0 Annobon, ZD7 St. Helena Island, 7Z1 Saudi Arabia, S9 Sao Tome, 9J2 Zambia, 9m6 Eastern Malaysia, E51 South Cook Isl., FK8 New Caledonia, A5 Bhutan, DU Philippines, XT2 Burkina Faso, 5T Mauritania, H40 Temotu Province, V51 Namibia, RI1 Franz Josef Land, and Others. My best band has been 17 meters."

Challenge Administrator Joe NA9A also cited improved propagation since the previous reporting period. "Thanks to great propagation on 15 and 20 meters during the CQWW-SSB contest, it was easier to work lots of countries," he said. Among those countries was a contact with 3COL Annobon Is.

Joe also shared some upcoming DX news:

9U* Burundi: The Mediterraneo DX Club is sending a DXpedition to this tiny African country for an operation running from November 6-17 as 9U4M. In addition to other modes, they will be operating with the new FT8 mode; even on 160M.

3W* - Vietnam: Tom Callas, KC0W is off again with his frequent DXpeditions. This time he's off to Vietnam as 3W9CW from November 17th to the 30th He'll be operating both CW and FT8. Tom requires QSLing direct only. He says he has five more countries on his list for future DX operations. Be careful if you try to make repeated insurance contacts on the same bands because if there are too many dupes, he's been known to refuse to QSL any.

V8* Brunei is the next stop after Vietnam for KC0W. From December $3^{rd} - 18^{th}$, he'll be V85/KC0W. Again, he'll be operating both CW and FT8. His activity will include 6 meters which could be a interesting test of the weak signal FT8 mode.

- 4S* Sri Lanka is being activated by Peter Vossen, DC0KK through November all the way through March next year. Watch for 4S7KKG. You'll have to wait until next April for QSLs when Peter returns to Germany.
- XW* Laos: Ken Claerbout K4ZW will be in Laos December 3-8 with the callsign XW4ZW. Ken will be mostly active on the lower frequency bands so propagation will be a big factor in successful contacts.
- XU* Cambodia NOT!: XU7XRO was recently spotted on the DX Cluster. That callsign is held by John Plenderleith, 9M6XRO. John says he hasn't been to Cambodia since 2010 so that spot was for a Pirate and doesn't count for anything.
- H4* Solomon Islands: H44MS will be active through November. The operator Bernard Stefan, DL2GAC runs only SSB and is known to like hunting US counties, so maybe Kane County is on his wish list.

The December ArcOver will bring the final HF Challenge update for the year, which includes scores from Jan. 1st through Nov. 15th. Be sure to send your updates by Nov. 20th to be included. Final scores for 2017 will be announced in January.

The rain was getting a lot of things wet including the generator, so we moved it closer to the stations out of harm's way and even with it running, it didn't create enough noise to be a problem. Batteries would have been the only thing quieter, but would not have supported all the computers and monitors. Jim also provided an Eagle vertical that worked wonders on 40 meters. The SWR was close to 1.5 to one so we were very happy. We utilized N3FJP's latest IL QSO party software and it worked well. After the contest we submitted our logs to LOTW and to the ILQP team. According to Dave, we immediately got conformations on LOTW. We will have to wait for some time to see how the club faired in the scoring of the contest.

Additionally during October, Dan WA9YKK put together a list of things that we hope will support a club Go Kit to be used for things like outreach. We had a successful year, but want to make it more efficient for next year so we can attend even more outings with more coordination. We will discuss the Go list at the November meeting.
