Election: John, AG9D- Chairman of the Nominating Committee reviewed the election process and introduced the candidates for Officer; each candidate was offered the opportunity to address the membership for a period of time not to exceed two minutes. Leadership Roundtable – Summary Report (part 2 of 2)

During our membership meeting on Sept. 18th (one week late due to our meeting space being closed on the 11th) we held a special "Leadership Roundtable" exercise. Each of the members who attended were given the opportunity to discuss issues pertaining to our club. Everyone who attended enjoyed the exercise and provided valuable input.

The FRRL Board of Directors reviewed the comments and suggestions during its October meeting. We will be using this input during future planning sessions. Thank you for participating! And please remember, your comments are always welcome. If you like, drop one of us an email or catch us at a meeting.

Here are the results from the final two issues discussed. (The information on the first two issues was published in the November, 2007 issue of the *ArcOver*.)

FRRL Leadership Workshop - Operating Events:

Our breakout group included 11 members and two Board facilitators.

After an explanation that there are many potential types of operating events at different times of the year, and that these events usually required some planning and coordinating by a person or committee, we had a spirited and very positive discussion with lots of new ideas. The aspect of who would lead these events was not further discussed.

- Operating events should be hands on and educational, especially for new hams. Getting on the air with antennas constructed at the event was universally endorsed.
- Fox hunts were discussed with two sessions divided into design and material planning and later the actual hunt.
- Kit building and then putting the radios on the air seemed like a lot of fun.
- One suggestion was to have members arrive at a site with their mobile radios and exchange ideas and solutions for effective, attractive, quality installations. Getting on the air with side by side comparisons was discussed.
- Having a two station contest competition between a W9CEQ team and a W9NE team with some antenna parity.
- Field optimization of HF/VHF/UHF home built antennas, assuming the availability of suitable test equipment.
- PSK Workshop already in the planning stage by K9FE
- Have another "Field Day" in October when the weather is cooler. Perhaps even a Winter event.
- QRP Contest events, perhaps with multiple simultaneous radios and/or side by side comparisons.
- Non contest events targeting new operators to help them confidently get on the air.

- EMCOM practice sessions
- Operating events designed for public exposure, instead of being internally focused.
- Public service events where it is necessary to be prepared for the unexpected, such as a canoe
 accident, etc.
- Field trips to the homes of new hams where experts would offer advice and newer hams would learn. If possible, try to install an antenna and demonstrate what is possible.

FRRL Leadership Workshop – Field Day/Hamfest:

This group was tasked with the review and thoughts on our two major yearly events; Field Day and our Hamfest.

Field Day Comments:

- The group felt that the site was good.
- The group felt that the antennas were placed improperly and indicated that the band captains should follow the technical plan that was designed to provide the least interference between stations. Several last minute changes caused unnecessary interference between stations. Follow the plan.
- Filters need to be used on every transmitter to reduce interference between stations on the same and other bands.
- Advertise field day better. Send out information to hams in the area that are not members of the club. There are a lot of hams that do not know about the club or field day.
- Provide some type of station to station communication to avoid interference. Signal light, chat group.
- For better frequency coordination have operating frequency ranges posted including GOTA ranges to minimize interference. Example, GOTA operates 7.20 to 7.3, 40 phone operates 7.125 to 7.200. This frequency coordination should be established for all bands GOTA operates, if GOTA goes off the air signal all stations.
- The FIELD DAY Technical Coordinator provides technical guidance to interfering stations. We
 need to make sure the guidance is heeded and recorded to insure that the same issue does not
 occur the following year.
- Insure that the food team has enough members so the job does not become a burden.

Field Day, Con't:

- Possible utilize new and different power sources.
- Have a safety coordinator, medical, fire; hazard, etc. have a plan.

Hamfest Comments:

- The group felt that it was too hard to move through the crowded space.
- Due to the diversity of the attendees the team would like to see an air conditioned facility to reduce heat stress, or more capability for air circulation.
- Would having the hamfest on Saturday be viable? Are other dates viable.
- Check all sources for possible alternate air conditioned sites including the Park District.
- Everyone wants to continue water delivery outside to the flee market area.
- Have a better liaison with staff owning site and also vendors
- Provide better advertising. Send out invitations to all area hams not just club members.
- Have door prizes vs. cash, possibly meals from restaurants.
- Have more programs. Everyone liked the programs.
- Have alternate vendors i.e. have vendors that provide merchandize for spouses. Have vendors
 of ancillary products like first aid kits, generators, tents and shelter vendors etc. Make the hamfest spouse friendly.
