Can you hear me now?

All I could say was, "Wow! That's a lot of microphones!" My head was swiveling from side to side trying to take it all in. I looked over and saw Dean KC9EOQ, doing the same thing I was, focusing on one microphone after another. Then I heard, "Gee, that's neat!" from Bill KB9YSI.

The three of us slowly shuffled our way through what must be the most complete microphone collection in the country. Located in an unassuming warehouse, on the 2nd floor of his Milwaukee sound equipment rental business, we found Bob Paquette and his collection of over 1000 specimens in his Microphone Museum.

Dean, Bill and myself drove to Milwaukee to attend the annual Superfest, a fun event hosted by Amateur Electronic Supply. We left early enough to meet up with Bob Paquette and get a private tour of his wonderful collection of old microphones, recording equipment, public address horns and amplifiers and early television cameras and studio equipment.

Years earlier I had met Mr. Paquette in a professional capacity and was introduced to his microphone collection. This was perhaps 1979, when Bob was still actively seeking additional apparatus to be included with his impressive collection. Since then, I had always wanted to return. At that time I was a college intern working in Racine in the field of industrial television. The company I was working for at the time hired his companies services to record a voice over track for a training film I was helping to make.

I called about a week before Superfest to see if the Museum might be open on Friday the 30th. Mr. Paquette told me that I was in luck, he had just completed renovations and everything was back in order for visitors. As you begin your trek through the Museum, you are surrounded by early recording equipment. Movie house transcription machines, large PA horns, a television camera mounted to a movie crane, and lots of military patches and insignias. (Bob is a former U.S. Air Force enlistee.) This first room is perhaps 14 feet wide by 50 feet long. There were so many microphones and other recording equipment around, I thought this room was the beginning and end of the tour.

We spent perhaps 40 minutes in this first room, only to discover we had just seen a small percentage of the collection. Mr. Paquette slowly opened the door to an adjoining room, his "workshop" he called it. Wow, that's when we really began to understand the scale of it all. Everywhere we looked, on the floor, on benches, on shelves, even hanging from the ceiling was an enormous collection of everything and anything that was used in the radio, TV and recording industry.

It was while in the "workshop" where we were introduced to Mr. Paquette's amateur radio license. Dated 1952 was a novice license, WN9VAQ. Sure enough, for a short time, one year exactly, Mr. Paquette was a licensed amateur radio operator. When we asked him why he did not pursue the hobby, his only reply was, "...just not enough time."

The collection did not stop there. Now the three of us had been there for nearly an hour, when Mr. Paquette opened the door to the third and final room. There before us was a freshly carpeted room, perhaps 40 feet by 50 feet, with microphones of every shape, style, construction and purpose you could ever imagine.

The first microphone Mr. Paquette wanted to show us was his "1876 Bell Transmitter" which he proudly displayed. We continued walking around the room with Mr. Paquette enthusiastically picking up a microphone and describing when it was made, by whom, and what it was used for. He pointed out several microphones used prior to WWII, then showed us a model which the Germans had used during their propaganda rally's.

Microphones of every description, like those used for broadcasting the war reports from London, those used to entertain the troops, even microphones used aboard military aircraft, tanks and ships were on display.

For over 50 years, Bob Paquette has been locating, buying, and learning about microphone technology. Manufacturers include; Amperite, Astatic, Bell Labs, Collins Radio, E.F. Johnson, Electro-Voice, Frost Radio, Magnavox, Neumann, RCA, Western Electric, Shure Brothers, Sound Engineering Corp., and Universal Microphone to name but a few.

With a little gleam in his eye, Bob handed Dean an acoustic transducer... a spring steel fob attached between two electric magnets. Bob plugged the device into an audio amplifier and instructed Dean to "bite down on the fob and listen." With a little trepidation, Dean complied. "Oh my," he exclaimed, "there's sound coming out of my head... right out of the middle of my head!" Of course Bill and I had to try this. Sure

enough, the transducer vibrated with the amplitude of the music Bob was playing and transferred that energy into our craniums. What an interesting experience that was.

The collection spans the earliest microphone development to about 1960. His wife Ruth encouraged Bob to gather all his resource materials and compile a book about the vast collection. In 1999, Mr. Paquette did in fact publish his book, "The History and Evolution of the Microphone." I'm proud to say that I own an autographed copy.
