As I write this it is a nice day out for field day. Mid 50 degree temps, and rainy. We always talk about field day as the 4th full weekend of rain in June. Well we know that is not true simply because I don't think it really rains every weekend in June. We have had some very wet field days however. Field day is quote NOT A CONTEST. According to the ARRL the Field Day exercise is to be a test of emergency communications.

For example, if your entire home town is incommunicado using normal communication methods, can you or your local amateur radio group set up an impromptu emergency station to be able to communicate to other locales in the country to pass health and welfare traffic or emergency traffic? And the goal is to prove that using different modes, frequencies and antennas the amateur community can come through with the needed communications to other stations around the country. All that being said, the thrill of competition makes field day the most popular radio event of the year. The plus to the event: we get to play radio for up to 24 hours straight OR you get to hang out with other hams and shoot the breeze with others of same mind OR you have a fantastic weekend of friends, family, and food. Actually we usually get a mixture of all three. The radio time is important for many. Many of us do not have a really usable home radio shack, sometimes, because of location and sometimes just personal choice.

Well at field day you can get to operate the radios you may have read about and seen pictures of, but never had the opportunity to key the microphone or pound the brass. You have the chance to watch and assist some of the club's top operators. Every year we see different antennas. One of our favorites in past years was the infamous AH6EZ 160 meter E-H antenna, or as some of us call it, the SCUD missile. This is one strange looking antenna with somewhat questionable physics, yet it worked. If you had not seen this antenna you were able to find a picture on our website in the field day pictures in earlier years. I am sure Dick would be glad to show us some of his pictures. Then there is the venerable HyGain HyTower that Dorwin K9DHK brings. The HyTower is a multi band 53 foot vertical! This antenna was the best vertical on the market (in the pre-SteppIR time, the SteppIR has set a new standard for verticals). There are antennas that look like an umbrella frame, known as a Spider Beam and the wire one held up by a crossed spreader frame called a Moxin. AH6EZ has built and used both of these at previous field day events. Who knows what he will use this year. You never can tell when one of the antennas you see will give you an idea of what you can use in your station. It could be the simplicity of the dipole that excites you to build your own.

Eric, AB9OS, is this year's field day chair. The location is Johnson's Mound. The FRRL used this site many years ago and it was notably not a favorite. That was then and not now. There have been improvements to shelters, parking lots added, and tree growth. So I predict this will be a great site for this year's exercise. To make it successful, a few things need to occur. SKYWARN

Spring is here, and as our thoughts turn to gardening, good DX and public service events, it is also the time for severe weather. SKYWARN is run by local ARES, civil defense groups and concerned citizens. We are all trained weather spotters, and report our findings to local Emergency Management and the National Weather Service.

(Many groups have similar policies, but what is relayed here is for Kane County.)

Severe Weather Watch - a net will go into stand-by mode on the OEM repeater, you will hear occasional announcements about the weather watch, with updates as needed. The repeater is free for regular traffic, but leave longer breaks between transmissions in case the net control operator has to break in to take the net to active status. If you have a question about the pending weather, feel free to ask!

Severe Weather Warning - the net will go active, and become a directed net. Spotters will be checking in, and assigned to various locations in the county. Some will act as relays, some will spot from home.

If we are in an active, directed net, there are a few things you should know:

- We can only relay reports from trained spotters.
- Please DO NOT break into the net unless it is an emergency.
- IF you are a trained spotter, and have checked into the net, please check out when you go off the air, or are leaving the county.

If severe weather hits the county, LISTEN to the directions of Net Control. We may have to start prioritizing what damage we can relay. At times like this, we cannot relay every downed branch and tree.

ARES is always looking for storm spotters. We have training and we can send you out with an experienced spotter until you feel comfortable. Email us for more information: N9CV@arrl.net. (OEM repeater - 145.47, minus offset - PL of 103.5 Hz)

Radio in the Park – an FRRL-Sponsored Operating Event

If you travelled to every local park, recreation area and forest preserve in our local area you would end up visiting over 150 different locations. This is one reason the FRRL is sponsoring a new operating event program which we call "Radio in the Park". The purpose of the program is to encourage members to get out of the shack and into the fresh air by operating individual amateur radio stations in our local parks and forest preserves.

The program is simple – club members set up stations in any of our local recreation areas and operate those stations. There is no fixed schedule, designated weekend, or any of the other organizational requirements. The only things that you should do to make the program work are to let your fellow hams know when and where you will be operating and send the program coordinator some information when you get home so he can track the scope of the program.

The goals of Radio in the Park are simple too. The idea is to have fun with amateur radio, to share experiences with fellow hams, to practice emergency preparedness, and perhaps to demonstrate amateur radio to the people that wander by your station. There are no requirements for power levels, modes, antennas, or emergency power. If you want to run a pedal-powered QRP station, that's cool. If you want to drive into a park and work QRO sideband from your car, that's cool too.

Here's how to get started. First, pick a location. There are websites for the Kane County Forest Preserve District, the Fox Valley Park District, and the local township and city parks departments which will show you locations and facilities. Second, post the date, time and type of operating you'll be doing on the FRRL Yahoo Group so others know what is going on. If you notify the program coordinator, NF9D, I'll be happy to take care of the notifications for you. Third, get on the air and have fun. Use your personal call sign so you can participate in contests and receive QSL cards. And finally, let me know how many contacts you made, who did the operating, and if you had any visitors.

I will be posting a simple guide for what to report in the files area of the Yahoo group, along with links to the various websites and some suggestions for preserves and parks you can visit.

One other thing – food is not only allowed, it's encouraged. Most of the parks have cooking facilities so you can grill hot dogs and other goodies. Just remember that many of the shelters and covered facilities can be reserved in advance, so please defer to families and groups that have made reservations. And, of course, respect the facilities and leave things the way you found them.
