His operating covers the gamut from 160 meters to 13 cm and from DX'ing to ragchewing but he can be found on 6 Meter SSB/CW weak signal and 40 Meter CW just about every night. He am interested in "organized" activities on the air that promote usage of the bands. For instance; he is usually on 1296.1 SSB every Friday night at 9PM for the local activity night and on 10 meters every Monday night for the CW and SSB 10-10 nets. He spends the majority of his ham radio time homebrewing and building. When I am in the shack working he is listening to 50.125 and 144.2 SSB and has the Fox "-.21" on in the background.

Kermit holds a Commercial 2nd Class RadioTelegraphy License and a Commercial General RadioTelephone Operator's License, both with the Ship Radar Endorsements in addition to his Amateur license.

His favorite club activity is field day, since it gives him a chance to renew old acquaintances, form new friendships and stay up way, way too late.

Going backwards poses a problem since you cannot use your *QRO* contacts for *Operator IF* they were gotten with higher power than the class you want to be eligible to be in. Remember the 250-watt output power limit on the *Operator* category.

Remember to get your updated *totals* to me by the 15th of each month to have them included in the *ArcOver*. If you are a day late of so, don't worry, I'll still get them in. Send them to <u>challenge@frrl.org</u>. Also include a list of rare and not so rare entities you have worked so we can all be a part of the HF hunting. The bands may seem dead, but make sure you try...you never know how the propagation can change.
