Held at St. Rita of Cascia, Aurora, IL**

Meeting Minutes April 12, 2011

The meeting was called to order at 7:39 PM by John Spasojevich AG9D– President with 55 attendees.

- John AG9D welcomed all to the April meeting, and asked that each attendee introduce him/herself and answer the question “FT-817 or Flex 1500?” The results of the poll were FT-817 23 votes, Flex 1500 24 votes, and undecided 8 votes.
- Secretary’s Report: John AG9D announced that the meeting minutes for the March 8, 2011 Regular Meeting are available in *ArcOver* on the FRRL website. Mike K9FE motioned to accept the minutes, which was seconded by Marty N9NTM. The motion carried.
- Treasurers Report: John AG9D announced that the particulars of the Treasurer’s Report was available directly from Dean KC9EOQ on request from any FRRL member.

- Announcements: The following announcements made:
 - John AG9D reported that the LEO Satellite Antenna Building Session was held on Saturday, March 19th. Nine LEO antennas were constructed and evaluated with an antenna analyzer.
 - MS-Walk: There are six to eight volunteers needed to assist with this May 1st event.
 - Oswegoland Big Mouth Adventure Race, Sat. April 30. Volunteers are needed. Contact team@dupageares.org
 - K9FE reported that a volunteer work day to organize and inventory club property was held on Saturday, March 26th at Penninger Radio. Tent components were sorted and color-coded. The storage cabinet was organized as well as the overall storage area.
 - Orv Erickson won the evening door prize, a lightning protector.

- Committee Reports
 - Cougars Night – John AG9D noted that this event will be the July 15th Cougars baseball game. Ken N9WCX has tickets, and FRRL life members receive a free ticket.
 - Education – Eric AB9OS reported that the General Class Upgrade Sessions will commence Saturday, April 9 at Rasmusen. Eric noted that several enrollees resulted from a published announcement of the classes provided by Dawn KC9LQS to the *Kane County Chronicle*.
 - Field Day – Mike K9FE reported that Field Day will be held at Johnson’s Mound, Elburn. This year’s event will emphasize simplicity. Grills will be used to prepare basic food items. A Band Captain meeting will be held in 2-3 weeks.
 - Hamfest – Preparations for the FRRL Hamfest to be held on Sunday, July 10th are on track. Tickets were available at the meeting from Dean KC9EOQ. Tickets will be mailed to members who have yet to obtain them.
 - Nets: Dawn KC9LQS noted that she is always looking for Net Control volunteers. Sign-up now!
 - Newsletter - Tobi K9TCD reported that, in addition to its present availability on the FRRL website, future issues of *ArcOver* will also be distributed as a PDF E-mail attachment to members.
 - Program – Dick AH6EZ reported that this meeting’s program topic would be “HF Propagation Prediction.” For the May meeting he proposed a “Go-Kit Challenge” to demonstrate the process of quickly assembling and using emergency communications equipment. He is working with Bill NF9D on this program.
 - Radio in the Park - Bill NF9D reported that the first event scheduled for May 21 will be held on the grounds of St. Rita of Cascia Church and the second event on August 13 will be held at Campton Forest Preserve, Elburn. Please share your ideas for activities with Bill.
 - VE Team – Doug W9RD reported that he needs a volunteer to manage the next license exam session.

- Old Business
 - Membership Survey – Dawn KC9LQS discussed the on-going FRRL membership survey. All attendees were asked to complete the survey on-site or download the survey and return it to Dawn.

- New Business
 - Dick W9GIG addressed the group regarding requests for event communications assistance by public service organizations. His concern was the need to properly manage the personnel resources of the club, and he observed that the group should improve its “rules of engagement” before committing to these activities. He felt that better scheduling coordination is needed and that no external activities should interfere with major club events such as Field Day or the Hamfest. He stated that it is important to constrain the load imposed by supplemental activities to a workable level and to avoid ineffectively dissipating time and energy.

Social Media Part 1

As many of you know, the FRRL recently opened an account on the Twitter web service, and also created a “page” on Facebook. We hope that by using these new social media tools we can improve communications with and between club members and add to our enjoyment of amateur radio.

All of this new fangled social media web stuff can be a bit confusing, so I’m going to try to explain some details in a series of articles. This first article will introduce Twitter.

Twitter is a service that allows people to communicate and stay connected through the exchange of quick, frequent messages. People write short updates, often called ‘Tweets’, of 140 characters or fewer. These messages are posted to your Twitter account profile and sent to your ‘followers’. They are also searchable using Twitter search.

To use Twitter, you need to open an account. Using a web browser, go to twitter.com and click the big yellow ‘Sign Up’ button. You will need to select a user name, and provide an email address and a password. Once you are signed up you need to select people to follow. Following someone simply means receiving their Twitter updates. When you follow someone, every time they post a new message it will appear on your Twitter home page. It’s like turning the dial on your radio and tuning to a station you want to hear, or subscribing to a magazine. Messages from those you follow appear on your home page as they are posted, so you always get the updates in real time. When you log in, you can see what the latest updates are.

You find people by using Twitter search, searching on names or user names. To get started, enter *foxriver-radio* in the search box just to the right of the Twitter Logo at the very top of the page. When the result appears on the right side of the screen, click the ‘Follow’ button next to the name. Now you are following the FRRL, and club tweets will appear in your timeline. If you want to follow my personal tweets, search for *@wcmster*. The ‘@’ character is used to identify a Twitter username.

If you click on the *foxriverradio* link, the profile page will open. Here you will see recent tweets, any favorite tweets, and lists of followers and people being followed. You can use this information to find other people with the same interests that you might want to follow.

You can also find people by clicking on the ‘Who To Follow’ link on the top menu. This opens a page with suggestions, lets you browse by areas of interest, or search using your address books or other social network friends lists. The suggestions offered get more and more specific as you add followers, as the software has a larger base of data to use to identify people who share your interests.

If you want to look for specific tweets related to amateur radio you can search using hashtags. A hashtag is simply a word preceded by the # character. Tweeters use this convention to identify a specific area of interest that applies to a tweet. For example, if you enter *#hamradio* in the search box you will be shown a list of tweets that have that hashtag included in the tweet. You can then click on the menu items just above the tweets to further refine the search. Remember, if you publish a tweet related to ham radio, try to include the *#hamradio* hashtag to help others to find it.

area by far. What good is it to collect bodies, there is no contest to see who can be the biggest. However, the BEST are measured by their ability to give back to their club and to their community. I'm not asking you to volunteer for every event, every time. But I am asking you to volunteer at least a few hours of your time to help carry the load. If you don't, and the few who do decide to stop, then what?

You don't have to use hashtags to search. You can search on individual words or terms. For example, if I enter *QRP* in the search box, I am shown a collection of tweets that contain that term, either as part of a hashtag (*#qrp*) or simply with the term *QRP* in the text. Note that you have the option of saving an individual search for later use.

As you read the tweets on your timeline you can mouse over each one and see some additional options. You can mark a tweet as a favorite, retweet it (post it to your timeline), or reply to the tweet. Also remember that you can click on any links included in the tweet to visit the linked page.

There are a number of additional features offered by Twitter. You can include photos or videos in your tweets, connect your Twitter account to your Facebook profile or a personal website, or use it to send direct private messages to people you follow. Twitter offers a nice collection of help files to assist you in exploring further.

Several companies have developed other alternatives for using Twitter. Products like *TweetDeck*, *Twitterific*, and *TwitPic* can provide additional features and convenience. There are also Twitter aps for smart phones that will let you tweet directly from your phone. (OK, maybe that's going a bit too far for right now.) The real value of Twitter begins when you get involved and start to contribute by posting your tweets and retweeting things you find interesting. The more involvement we get, the more we can all share in the excitement of amateur radio.
